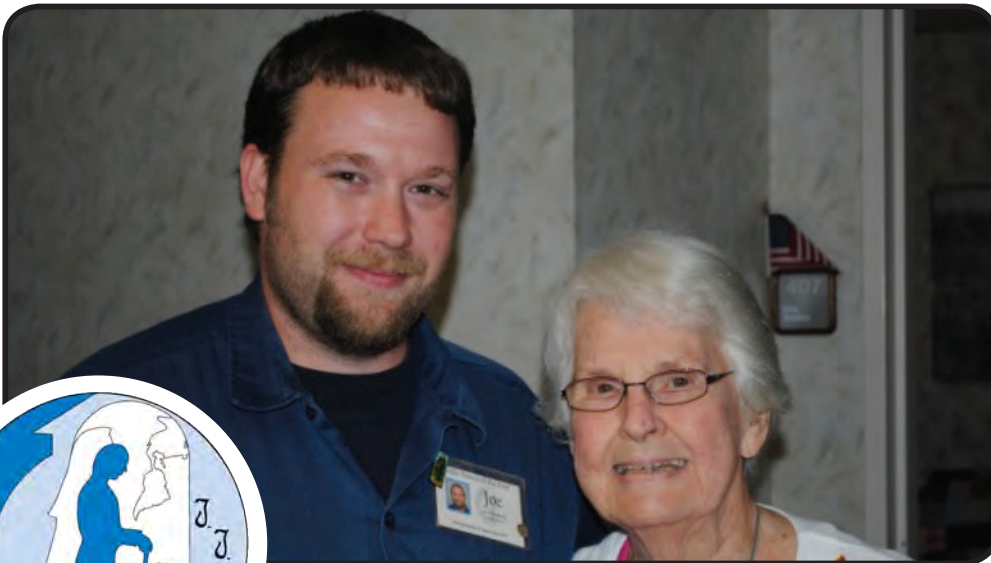

Staff to Resident ratios are lower at St. Paul's Home than the state average, enabling medical and non-medical staff to know and care for Residents as family – not as room numbers.

Lay staff members provide much of the direct medical care on the nursing floors, and staff from all departments provide additional supports on the nursing floors as well as independent apartments. But the Sisters' presence is unmistakable.

### VOW OF HOSPITALITY
